2002 has been a remarkable year for Auckland Museum. First, there was the publication of our award-winning book, 150 Treasures.

And then, in October the Museum celebrated its 150th birthday with the opening of an ambitious exhibition on the extraordinary life of Sir Edmund Hillary. This was followed by a day of birthday celebrations complete with a giant Everest cake, cut by Sir Edmund himself.

Earlier in the year, Government granted the Museum half the funds required to complete our Grand Atrium project – a multi-level, multi-functional space providing $21^{\rm st}$ century facilities for Auckland's Museum. The appointment of a development manager for this project sees us well under way with fundraising.

Weird & Wonderful, our pioneering natural history discovery centre, reopened in November after a six month, million dollar renovation and is a feast for young and old.

Commemorating our past and celebrating the future has been the overriding theme for this landmark year. Partnerships with two weighty Auckland institutions, NZI Insurance and the New Zealand Herald, enabled us to present a series of exhibitions in support of Auckland's and the Museum's history; first off, More than a Mummy, the Museum's sesquicentennial exhibition celebrating 150 years of collecting; and secondly, Herald Eye on Auckland, a series of pictorial exhibitions drawing on the rich archives of both the Herald and the Museum. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our birthday sponsors for their encouragement and support during this landmark year.

2002 may be a hard act to follow; however, 2003 holds much promise, with commencement of our Grand Atrium building in September and a diverse and exciting range of exhibitions planned for the year ahead. In the meantime, join us in this festive season with a picnic in the park, and a peek at your Museum — Auckland Museum.


HOW DID NEW ZEALAND'S OLDEST MUSEUM GELEBRATE ITS 150TH BIRTHDAY?

With a cake as big as Mt Everest and a man as big

On Sunday 27 October, 150 years to the day since Auckland Museum first opened its doors, Kiwi legend Sir Edmund Hillary cut an enormous 1.8 metre-long Mt Everest cake, in honour of the Museum's birthday.

The day's other events included, free balloons for children, behind-the-scenes tours, birthday trails and performances by dancers from the remote

Eyv, who uses traditional hand-hooking techniques to make her creations, first learned the art form from her grandmother as a small child.

"Hand-hooking is a traditional technique using looped fabrics," explains Eyv. "In English mining communities, women would

get together and make rugs while the men were down the mines. Theirs was very much a 'mend and make-do' society. Today original

rag-rugs are very collectable, but at that time it was very much a paupers' craft." Today, Eyv has revitalised the technique, using it as a vehicle to comment on the role

of women and women's work, while creating



The Museum's latest collaboration with the New Zealand Herald, focuses on Auckland's maritime heritage.

Marking the presence of America's Cup racing in Auckland this summer and the publication of a new Herald and Penguin book entitled *On the Water*, is an exhibition of images from the Museum's and Herald's collections which capture men and machines under pressure.

Action-packed photographs of sleek racing yachts have been selected from the collections of Marine Photos and the Museum's Henry Winkelmann collection, and provide a vibrant contrast to recent colourful photographs of Louis Vuitton yacht racing on the Waitemata Harbour.

The exhibition covers caricatures from Gordon Coates to David Lange.
