Towards New Displays

tion is now in progress to ensure the most effective use of the unique spaces within the Museum and its inner courtyard.

Staff Project Teams have been put together to plan various aspects of the Museum's redevelopment. Amongst these are three teams of staff and outside experts who will plan overall display and interpretation in the Museum's three key disciplinary areas of War Memorial, Natural History and Human History. A fourth team will be making recommenda-

tions on the re-presentation of the Applied Arts Collections.

Although there will be significant cross-referencing between the disciplines, three major zones featuring New Zealand and Pacific History, the landscape and ecology of New Zealand, and the history of New Zealand in conflict, will be developed. These will complement the Maori Hall and Applied Arts galleries.

The first new display to open will be Stage I of New Zealand at War, part of the War Memorial section being developed to commemorate the end of World War II fifty years ago.

Major new Special Exhibition areas are also being planned. These will provide improved facilities and allow for a much more intensive and energetic exhibitions programme in the future. During the next year or two this programme, like much else, will be affected by the refurbishment, but Museum visitors can look forward to a very exciting exhibitions future.

Redevelopment and Refurbishment Proceeds

As preparations for building refurbishment, renewal of essential services and new construction get

underway a team has been recruited to assist the Museum directorate with design and planning.

Carson Project Management will continue as consultant project managers, with John Wilson heading the professional team, assisted by David Wilkie in the position of Assistant Project Manager.

Noel Lane, of Noel Lane Architects, has been engaged as project architect and is now reviewing the concept proposals and such issues as circulation, security and fire protection.

Quantity surveyors Rider Hunt Holmes Cook will provide estimating and cost planning services. Further design consultants will be appointed as necessary.

As designing of the main redevelopment proceeds, plans are being made also for work to begin next year on such tasks as the cleaning of the front foyer and the improvement of the front basement rest rooms. Upgrading of the Museum's fire detection systems is being carried out to required standards and all potentially harmful PCB components have been removed from fluorescent lights throughout the Museum. The new paintings and drawings storeroom facility is nearing completion and will greatly improve the storage of and access to this collection.

Governance

During the past twelve months the Museum has worked with the Institute, the Territorial Local Authorities, Maori interests and others to develop new legislation aimed at streamlining and modernising the Museum's governance structure. The draft legislation is now in the final stages of referral and approval, and will make its way to Parliament at the end of the year. In the meantime, an operating company, Auckland Museum Enterprises Limited, will provide interim management of the Museum's redevelopment until the new structures are in place.

Notice to Readers Library Closure

Staff News

A regrouping of Museum staff into the three operational divisions of Collections, Public Programmes and Finance/Administration has led to the creation of three Assistant Director's positions. Two of these have been filled by the internal appointments of Anthony Wright (Collections) and Steven McLean (Finance/Administration). The Public Programmes position will be filled by Jennifer Cave who comes to the Museum from the position of Director, Capital Discovery Place, Wellington. A Maori Liaison Officer, whose responsibilities will reach across all Museum operations, will soon be appointed. This position will be critical in maintaining the Museum's Iwi relationships as well as developing Maori oriented programmes and services and ensuring a Maori perspective in all of the Museum's endeavours.

Staff who have joined the Museum recently include Customer Assistance Officers Veronica Brand, Eddie Fowke and Chris Ho (part-time) and Custodian Michael Sprott. They bring a wide range of experience and skills much appreciated by the Museum.

Honorary Life Member

At the Annual General Meeting on 21st November Commodore Len Stanners was elected an Honorary Life Member of Auckland Institute and Museum. Len, the Honorary Curator of Musical Instruments, began his long and valuable career with the Museum in 1985. In 1990 he offered his services to the Department of Applied Arts on a full-time basis and since then has continued to support the Museum in the generous manner recognised by this honour.

Important New Acquisition

An important Gothic Revival style bread plate designed by A W N Pugin (1812-1852) and made by Minton in or about 1848 has been acquired by the Museum's Applied Arts department. This plate is Pugin's earliest tableware design for Minton and has special significance as possibly the only known dated example.

Pugin, the English architect, designer and writer, was significant in the revival of medieval gothic design in architecture and the decorative arts. His association with Minton began in the early 1840s when Herbert Minton produced a number of his designs for inlaid tiles which were directly influenced, in design and manufacture, by medieval tiles. The bread plate is also decorated in this manner, using a technique called encaustic which involves the inlaying of coloured clays.

Inventory of Archey Collection Completed

Malcolm Ross, employed in the Library under the Task Force Green scheme, has completed an inventory of the Sir Gilbert Archey Collection of negatives and transparencies of ethnographic subjects. The emphasis of the collection is on Maori and Polynesian traditional material culture with the majority of the 1760 negatives relating to the

New Book Published

Of interest to all who have wondered about the origin of the birdcalls heard in our backyards and gardens is New Zealand Songbirds, just published by Godwit Press. Comprising a cassette audiotape of the calls of 25 New Zealand birds and an accompanying booklet, it includes many of the birds most likely to be heard in our towns and cities. The booklet was produced by two Museum staff - Brian Gill, Curator of Birds wrote the text and Juliet Hawkins, Artist-Technician with the Museum School Service provided the illustrations. New Zealand Songbirds is available from the Museum Shop. ■
