


warmth and welcome. Three new display boxes have been installed in order to display larger new items or special pieces as they arrive.

Inanne Gair - art of illusion

Joanne Gair is a master of illusion. As the world's leading image-maker and body painter, Joanne's artistry has gained iconic status since the publication of her Vanity Fair cover of Demi Moore in 1992. This image, along with 60 other tantalising photographs, will be presented in Voafone Body Art.

"You are in for a visual treat," says Joanne, whose show will feature images by some of the world's leading fashion and celebrity photographers. Life size prints of supermodels by Herb Ritts and Annie Leibovitz, will be accompanied by the tools of Joanne's trade – delicately handcrafted feather eyelashes, body painting pigments, paints and prosthetics.

For Joanne, who left New Zealand at the age of 21, Auckland Museum holds a special place in her heart and career. "My first body painting experience was at Auckland Museum," says Joanne. "As an 18 year-old teacher trainee, I drew mokos on school children and watched their faces come alive."

Celebrities represented in Joanne's show include Elle Macpherson, Gillian Anderson, Sarah O'Hare, Madonna, Pamela Anderson, Heidi Klum, Alek Wek and Demi Moore. For those who would like to see Joanne at work, she will be on site in the Museum on Sunday 16 December as part of the Museum's Living Treasures Day.



Buday G Richead - image ocetr

British-born photographer, Buggy G Riphead, made his name as a multi-media artist for English techno-pop band, Future Sound of London.

One of two local artists commissioned to capture New Zealanders' expressions of body art, Buggy's images are richly coloured and sublime, a mixture of photography and digital manipulation.

Inspired by German Romanticism and 19th century landscapes, Buggy's body art images will explore individuals' connections to their body art, communities and to the landscapes they inhabit. "Indigenous tattoo and the new 'global village' will come together in a turn of the century snapshot of New Zealand culture," says Buggy.

Buggy's work has been exhibited at the Tate Gallery, Barbican and London's Institute of Contemporary Arts.



Arno Gasteiger – inscribed journeys

Arno Gasteiger is interested in people's journeys. Born in Innsbruck, Austria but resident in New Zealand since 1988, Arno has made a few journeys of his own. The difference between Arno and the people he has photographed for Vodafone Body Art is that Arno's journeys are not inscribed on his skin.

"It doesn't worry me where people come from," says Gasteiger, who spent six weeks following eight individuals. "What interests me is where people are going and how they've developed."

In tracing the lives and lines on the bodies of his subjects, Gasteiger's photographs tell life stories. "My aim was to tell people's histories by referring to their various tattoos," explains Arno. "These marks were obtained at specific and significant stages of their lives. The stories they tell are of a search for self and identity." Arno Gasteiger is the photographic editor of New Zealand Geographic.

Snap Happy



A nostalgic snapshot of New Zealand family life is the focus of the latest exhibition from the

Museum's Pictorial Gallery.

Snap Happy, an exploration of vernacular photography from the 1880s to the 1950s, follows developments in amateur photography from formal Victorian portraits, to candid family moments.

Actual photo albums in addition to enlarged prints complete with mounts and personal hand-written captions, are on display.

"Snap Happy is a delightfully human exhibition," says pictorial curator Gordon Maitland. "It's the happy times which are recorded in photographs -holiday shots, new babies, weddings and family pets—and it is these images which are displayed in Snap Happy."

OO Years of Nursing



In September 1901, New Zealand became the first country in the world to register nurses.

To commemorate the centenary of this event, Auckland Museum presents 100 Years of Nursing, a display of military nursing, comprising medals, uniforms and memorabilia from nurses who served in South Africa, World Wars I and II and Vietnam.

Located in the World War II Hall of Memories and the Armoury Resource Centre, 100 Years of Nursing includes medals and photographs from the Brent Mackrell collection, which was gifted earlier this year. "100 Years of Nursing focuses on the people behind the uniforms and their experiences as pioneers in their field," says history curator, Rose Young.

The exhibition runs until April 2002



150 Treasures

In 2002, Auckland Museum will celebrate 150 years of collecting, with the publication of a special book, 150 Treasures.

150 treasured artefacts and the stories that lie behind them, have been selected to represent the growth of Auckland Museum's collections and New Zealand's cultural heritage.

Written by collections manager Oliver Stead and stunningly illustrated by photographer Krzysztof Pfeiffer, 150 Treasures answers some of the many questions which have long puzzled Museum visitors —who killed Rajah the elephant and why did Pakeha curators paint Maori carvings red?

Glorified Scales

An installation by artist Maureen Lander, Glorified Scales explores the relationship between people, birds, images and words. Drawing on the Museum's ornithology, ethnology and pictorial collections, Lander brings together photographic images, poetry, light and sound in a multimedia exploration of birds, feathers, and the birtons of Museum

"Other concepts, queries and issues arise from the installation, says Maureen. "Are birds indeed glorified reptiles? Did dinosaurs have feathers? Could and should a huia be cloned? Viewers may have their own perceptions, questions and explanations."

Maureen Lander is a senior lecturer in Maori material culture at the University of Auckland, where she is also currently completing a Doctorate in Fine Arts. Maureen has exhibited widely in New Zealand and internationally, over the last fifteen years.

Glorified Scales is on display in the Decorative Arts West Gallery, first floor, until 3 March 2002

Ferns and Folk

Ferns and Folk is an exhibition which celebrates the New Zealand fern in our sporting, cultural and decorative arts history.

Drawing on items from the Museum's applied arts, botany and social history collections, Ferns and Folk focuses on the work and career of Herbert B Dobbie, a writer, traveller, botanist and woodcarver, whose fascination with native ferns saw him produce the first comprehensive book on the subject in 1880.

In addition to Dobbie's work, Ferns and Folk explores the place of the fern in botanical research and discovery, and the development of our local craft tradition. As the emblem of the All Blacks, its significance in the hearts of sporty New Zealanders is also profiled, as is its presence on our military's regimental and reinforcement badges.


