

# Director's message

This issue of MQ comes out as the nation takes a holiday. An extensive programme of holiday events, and two contrasting exhibitions — ouch! and Toi Maori — the Eternal Thread — will provide plenty for families, visitors to Auckland and others to enjoy over the summer period.

2004 has been a wonderful year for the Museum, but a challenging one in some respects. Substantial progress has been made on the Stage II, Grand Atrium construction with the courtyard basement excavated, walls in place, foundations and lift pits in, and the steel structure to support the suspended dome building and the dome being erected. The two level underground carpark is leaping forward to a completion date of mid July. Excavation is complete, walls erected and the intermediate floor under construction. But high building cost escalation throughout the country - especially in Auckland has had an impact on cost. While we have held the cost increase to less than the national average escalation, and a rigorous cost control process has benefited the project, additional costs have had to be accepted if we are to retain the vision for this wonderful addition to our Museum. With a total cost of \$60 million and close to \$50 million in funding already raised, 2005 will be a year closely focused on completing the work and gaining the remaining funding to ensure that we open as planned, in December 2006.

Support from the community for the Museum, and for the Grand Atrium development, has been fantastic. Our funders have dug deep, showing that Aucklanders retain the vision for their Museum and their affection for it that motivated an earlier generation of benefactors who made the existing building possible more than 75 years ago. That building was greeted with great praise when it opened in 1929. We are confident that the vision embedded in the new development will be received with the same enthusiasm.

# Grand Afrium Update - We've Hit Rock Bottom!

The Museum's Grand Atrium project continues to run smoothly. Over the past 12 months, we have been steadily digging holes. Excavation of the Southern Courtyard has been largely completed however there is still some supplementary digging required which will take place on-and-off over the next year. The Museum's development will include a two storey underground car park, two levels for collection storage, a new special exhibition hall, a learning centre and an auditorium events centre. # Toi Maori The Eternal Thread

Te Aho Mutunga Kore - The Changing Art of Maori Weaving

Toi Maori – The Eternal Thread is the first major international touring exhibition to celebrate the changing art of Maori weaving, tracing how this art form has developed, reasserted and reinvented itself, from the finest traditional Maori cloaks to the outstanding contemporary work of today. Rare and precious cloaks will be on display from the collections of the Hetet family, the Te Kanawa family and other weaving dynasties.

This landmark exhibition, which is part of the AK05 festival, seeks to demonstrate and explain the spiritual significance of weaving within Maori culture. The cloaks on display are not only exquisite works of art but are seen as coats of leadership and spiritual protection, reflecting the status of tribal leaders among their people. The cloak itself becomes empowered by the status and mana of the owner and as a result the mana of the cloak increases when worn.

Toi Maori — The Eternal Thread reflects the history and evolution of the Maori people, combining the ancestral thread with a world of inspiring creativity.

Included in the exhibition are large photos of Maori ancestors wearing cloaks, providing compelling evidence of the significance of the cloak within Maori culture.

The exhibition also honours a new generation of artists who have created innovative works of art anchored in the concepts, materials and techniques of traditional weaving.

Toi Maori - The Eternal thread is the creation of Toi Maori Aotearoa working with Pataka Porirua Museum of Arts and Cultures.

# Historical Quilts – Pieces of the Past

An exhibition that tells the story of the evolution of the quilt in New Zealand. Using examples of English, Pacific Island and New Zealand historical and contemporary bedcoverings, Historical Quilts traces the evolution of the quilt in New Zealand textile practice. Many of the quilts, from Auckland Museum's own collections, have never been on display before.

The quilts on display are not only pieces of art, but also examples of change and evolution as they made their way to our shores.

# Nancy Crow: Constructions – Colour & Spatial Relationships

An exhibition highlighting the work of leading American quilt maker, Nancy Crow. Nancy has been in quiltmaking for over 25 years and has made over 300 pieces. Recognised worldwide for her quilting, and her teaching, Nancy Crow has been a maverick in pushing the boundaries of what a quilt can be.

Nancy Crow: Constructions comprises a series of pieces begun in 1996. Inspired by nature and her Ohio surroundings, these works of art showcase her remarkable and intuitive sense of colour and proportion.

This display of work from Devonport textile artist, Freda Brierley, aims to celebrate the working life of Freda's grandmother, Georgina Crighton. Georgina worked for fifteen years as a weaver in a mill in Dundee, Scotland.

# ROBIN MORRISON - Grand Landscapes

Robin Morrison was New Zealand's best loved and best known photographer. Prior to his death in 1993 he placed his life work, consisting of 100,000 images, with Auckland Museum; representing one of New Zealand's most comprehensive photographic collections

The new SKYCITY Grand Hotel has chosen a selection of 1000 of Robin Morrison's mainly unpublished prints from the Museum's collection for hanging in their rooms – each room will feature three unique prints. Before being hung in the hotel, the Museum will present a selection of chosen prints to the public in this exhibition, Robin Morrison – Grand Landscapes.

The images are New Zealand landscapes as seen from the road, from Stewart Island to the Coromandel to the Chatham Islands and more. There are rural and urban landscapes, natural features and man-made structures, scenes of decay and dereliction, and others of strong urban architecture. The selection of images was made with a view to showing Robin Morrison's eye for detail, for the humourous, for the colour and the juxtaposition, and for the essential kiwi character of each location.

# Patron's Dinner

The Museum Circle Foundation annually hosts a special dinner to thank its Patrons for their support during the year. The dinner took place at Auckland Museum in November 2004. The Patrons enjoyed a unique evening experiencing the hidden stories of the Maori Court as told by descendents and Guests of Honour, the Taumata-a-Iwi (Maori Advisory Board).

The Museum Circle Executive would like to thank all those who have helped promote and have contributed towards their two major fundraising initiatives in support of Auckland Museum's Grand Atrium project. Both campaigns are doing extremely well.

View to the Future will raise \$1.2 million towards the copper dome. A financial commitment of \$25,000, pledged over five years, will purchase one of the 48 copper segments of the dome. In recognition, the contributor's name will be etched onto one of the large windows that encircle the Event Centre underneath the dome. They will also receive a gift copy of the linen-bound Acknowledgement Book, recording the history of the 48 contributors.

Limited editions of the Neil Dawson Sculptures are still available, which have been created especially to mark the unveiling of the Copper Dome.

Entitled Quill, Cloud & Rangitoto, these sculptures are on sale at \$8000 (incl. GST) of which a \$4000 donation will go towards the Auckland Museum Stage II Grand Atrium project. This is a unique opportunity to acquire a fine work by an internationally recognised New Zealand artist commissioned especially to support a major historic development in the life of Auckland War Memorial Museum.
