Director's message

As we approach ANZAC Day, it is timely for the Museum to be exhibiting Another Vietnam and Vietnam: A Kiwi Snapshot. Another Vietnam is a National Geographic Society exhibition of photography by North Vietnamese photographers. It is an unusual and fascinating show, devoid of propaganda or polemic photographs, taken and processed under extremely adverse conditions, documenting the conflict from the 'other side'. Vietnam — A Kiwi Snapshot, on the other hand, documents the social condition in New Zealand during this unpopular war.

For those of us who are part of the Vietnam-generation, it seems so familiar and so recent. For younger people it is history - almost as distant as Gallipoli. A great deal of water has passed beneath a great number of bridges since the 1960s and the censure which greeted our soldiers who served in Vietnam on their return has faded. These paired exhibitions give us the opportunity to think afresh about that period, some forty years ago, and for younger folk to learn a little of their parents' generation's moral and ideological conflicts.

In this issue of MQ you will read about progress on the Museum's Grand Atrium Project. With the old auditorium infill building demolished, vehicle access cut through under the eastern side of the building into the courtyard area, pilling well underway, and the first excavation progressing rapidly, construction activity is impressive. Some \$48 million of the \$55 million fundraising target has been achieved and 2004, we hope, will see the target reached. At this stage completion of all aspects of the project is scheduled for September 2006.

TRN came on-board last month for a sponsorship period of five years and has already planned a wide range of promotional activities based around the Stage II Project and the Museum's exhibitions.



Another Vietnam

PICTURES OF THE WAR FROM THE OTHER SIDE

A collection of startling, never-before-published images of the Vietnam War by North Vietnamese photographers, is on display until 6 June.

There are two sides to every story, even in the midst of war. Another Vietnam: Pictures of the War from the Other Side presents over 100 evocative black-and-white images by North Vietnamese soldier-photographers who risked their lives to capture their country's struggle. Many perished – nine out of 10 did not survive.

For the North Vietnamese photographers, their images were used to win the war, and they considered their work a powerful weapon. Their photographs offer a new perspective on this divisive conflict and show scenes of battle and of daily life from the other side: elephants moving materiel down the Ho Chi Minh Trail, an impromptu operating room in a mangrove swamp and American prisoners of war at the Hanoi Hilton.

Another Vietnam is based on a book by photographer Tim Page, who returned to Vietnam to find his Vietcong counterparts,

20 years after he first covered the war as a young photographer for United Press International.

The exhibition is co-produced by the National Geographic Museum at Explorers Hall, Washington, and the International Center of Photography, New York.

VIETNAM – A KIWI SNAPSHOT

Accompanying Another Vietnam, is an exhibition presenting New Zealanders' perspective on this controversial conflict.

Vietnam - A Kiwi Snapshot, explores New Zealanders' memories of power politics, protest and the sacrifice made by our own young soldiers. It includes photography and memorabilia from frontline Kiwi soldiers, documentary film footage and original maps used by Kiwi regiments.

REMEMBRANCE: ANZAC DAY 2004





Every year, Auckland War Memorial Museum marks Anzac Day with a special programme of commemorative events.

The day commences with the dawn service at 5.30am, with a repeat service at 11. Opening to the public from 12 noon, the Museum will offer a range of performances, film screenings and craft activities for children.

At 12.30pm, Gunner Inglorious, a one-man play based on the autobiography of World War II veteran Jim Henderson, will be performed in the Manaia Room.

At 2pm, the University of Auckland Singers conducted by Karen Grylls will perform requiem pieces, including In Hora Ultima – At the Ultimate Hour by Lassus.

At 3pm, a compilation of historic films shot during World War I, entitled 'Zealandia's Great War on Film', will screen in the Manaia Room. This screening is organised in association with the New Zealand Film Archive and marks 90 years since the outbreak of World War I. Pianist Tama Karena will accompany these silent films.

Screening all day on the war memorial floor is a New Zealand documentary exploring Vietnam veterans' shifting perspectives of the global phenomena of war, 'From Memory' by Zoe Roland. This film is shown in association with our special exhibitions, Another Vietnam and Vietnam - A Kiwi Snapshot.

Between 12 noon and 4pm, jewellery-maker Kirsten Haydon will be demonstrating her work in the Decorative Arts West Gallery, and will end the day with a tour of her exhibition, In the Drawer, which is based on her grandfather's wartime experiences.

For the kids, poppy-making workshops will run in the Discovery Centre between 12 noon and 3pm.

TWO EXHIBITIONS HIGHLIGHTING NEW ZEALAND'S EXCELLENCE IN CERAMICWARE ARE ON DISPLAY IN THE DECORATIVE ARTS GALLERIES FROM MAY

PETER STICHBURY: DOMESTIC POTTER A SURVEY OF A PIONEER NEW ZEALAND STUDIO POTTER

Peter Stichbury: domestic potter, is the first survey of one of New Zealand's pioneer potters. Initiated by Auckland Museum to coincide with his 80th birthday, the exhibition has been selected by guest curator, Justine Olsen.

This exhibition will be the first major show on Stichbury and the first time his work has been presented in a public gallery on such a scale. As Stichbury has said: "It has been my belief that the potter should make pots that please them— if others appreciate the work that is produced then that is an extra bonus. I am grateful and proud to have been part of the exciting and creative pottery scene since the early 1950s."

Stichbury is recognised as the pivotal follower of the philosophies of the English potter Michael Cardew, in New Zealand. As a domestic potter he has believed in the freedom of expression while retaining the importance of function.

The exhibition acknowledges Stichbury's achievements as a ceramic artist of international stature. Coinciding with the exhibition will be a publication produced with assistance from Creative New Zealand.





An exhibition which explores the world of 'pop' ceramics opens in May. Curated for Auckland Museum by Mary Morrison, *Titian Studioware* is the first survey of the work of Cameron and Dorothy Brown, who returned to New Zealand at the end of World War II, establishing a ceramic studio in West Auckland and operating out of two army huts on Bethell's Road.

Later expanding to Henderson after receiving a Trade and Industry grant, their technical expertise and experimental approach led to the development of glazes that remain unsurpassed in Australasia.

The exhibition presents a collection of Titian's slip-cast ceramics from the 1950s and '60s, and explores the themes of New Zealand's pop ceramics, kiwiana kitsch and the influence of the neo-classical style.

ON DISPLAY IN THE DEGORATIVE ARTS EAST GALLERY FROM 28 MAY – 8 AUGUST 2004

Work is well underway on the Museum's multimillion dollar Grand Atrium Building. In November, the Museum Trust Board signed-off \$42.9 million for the first portion of construction which includes an underground car park, education centre, auditorium and exhibition halls.

In January, New Zealand's largest mobile crane lifted a 20-tonne digger over the rear of the Museum to begin demolition work. The crane returned again on 1 March to lift yet more heavy equipment into the courtyard so that excavation and piling work could begin. Working just as carefully behind the scenes is the Museum's Fundraising Advisory Board. Led by chair John Maasland, the Board soon hopes to announce its first major corporate naming rights' sponsor.

"We are inviting a select number of businesses to bring their corporate support in-behind this very iconic building and exciting project," says John.

Adding further support to the Project are two of the Museum's membership groups, the Museum Circle and the Auckland Museum Institute.

The Circle has pledged \$1.5 million from two initiatives; the first, "With a View to the Future" is the sale of copper segments which comprise the copper dome and sit atop the entire

The crane returned again on March to lift yet more heavy equipment into the courtyard so that excavation and piling work development; the second, is a limited edition sale of three separate Neil Dawson sculptures inspired by the copper dome. Named Rangitoto, Cloud and Feather, these pieces are distinctive representations of the Museum's new skyline.

The Museum Institute is driving a campaign to support the auditorium fit-out with state-of-the-art seating. For a \$1500 contribution, donors can purchase a chair and have their name permanently recognised on an auditorium honours' board.
