

1996 was destined to be one of the most disruptive years in the refurbishment of the Museum. And it was. Sadly, the next most disruptive

year is 1997! Our public has been marvellous. It would be foolish to suggest that there haven't been complaints – or that many of them weren't well founded.

But the complaints are relatively

few and far between given the continued high visitation. Some people have said, "why don't

you close down during the refurbishment?"

That possibility has been recognised, but never truly considered. It has been our conviction that it would be a serious mistake, and

On December 21, the second and final part of **Scars on the Heart** will open – along with the **Armoury Resource Centre**. This will complete a compelling and emotional exhibition, and provide a range of enquiry services that support it, and the Museum's role as a war memorial. The new displays will match the quality of the first section opened in February.

The new aircraft galleries will open in the new year and visitors will be able to see restoration work in progress on the Sptifire and Zero until May, when those galleries are opened in their final form. At the same time, the small galleries at the front of the building of Level Two will reopen, completing all of the Level Two works.

Later next year – in November – three new Decorative Arts Galleries and a second Children's Discovery Centre will be added to the list of completed works. The new café, and new style food services, opens prior to Christmas and the new Museum Store follows quickly at the beginning of February.

All the very best for a happy and safe festive season.

Scars on the heart story complete

The war officially ended with the signing of the Japanese instruments of surrender on 2 September 1945 on board Admiral William F Halsey's flagship the battleship USS Missouri.

From 21 December

The Museum's dramatic and compelling story of the impact of war on New Zealand is completed with the opening of the sections relating events during World War II, Asian Wars and Peacekeeping operations.

Again, guest curator Chris Pugsley brings together a collection of deeplymoving, personal stories through a wealth of letters, diaries, photographs, paintings and ephemera.

Visitors are taken through three different theatres of war: Europe, The Pacific; and The Home Front, which has been put together by Rose Young, the Museum's Curator of History.

The completion of **Scars on the Heart** also marks a closer relationship with the RSA whose members will staff the exhibition permanently. Their presence will serve not only to inform the public but to explain how so many New Zealander's have 'scars on the heart.'

Armoury Resource Centre

The new **Armoury Resource Centre**, on the top floor, will not only house the Museum's outstanding small arms collection but enable visitors to access a wealth of war information through photograph, film, oral history, print and computer interactives.

A significant resource for the Maori community will be Bernard Morrison's two-volume complete record of all those members of the Maori Pioneer Battalion who were killed or wounded in World War I.

A returned serviceman, from Hillsborough, Bernard Morrison has devoted the past 15 years to this extraordinary project.

Sadly, the work is in memory of Bernard and his wife Mary's only child, Katrina, who they lost in the Erebus disaster. Bernard had talked with Katrina, not long before her death, of his dream to develop a complete resource of Maori war dead. His particular interest in the service lives of Maori who had fought and died for New Zealand in the two World Wars was triggered through a woman who was elated to find her relative on the page of a War Graves Commission register at the Auckland City Library.

For each entry there is the army record, next of kin, departure date, war grave information, date of death and, in most cases, a photograph.

Work on Volume III, which represents the same coverage for the 28th (Maori) Battalion, will be completed by the end of the year.

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15 December 1996 -9 February 1997

This delightful exhibition of hundreds of rare, antique toys is a 'must' for youngsters and adults alike over the summer break.

On loan from a major private collection, the **Fisher-Price Toy Show** includes many of the most popular toys which have captured the hearts of children since Victorian times.

The collection boasts a visual extravaganza of teddy bears, tin and cast iron toys, board games and puzzles, space toys; and train sets to sketch the course of recent toy history.

Exquisite dolls from the MOTAT collection augment the display. It's also a chance for the Museum to showcase its recently acquired 300-piece 'Fun-Ho!' collection.

The strength of the exhibition represents the period 1840-1970 with the earliest piece an 1814 "dissected" puzzle, later a "jigsaw" puzzle with the invention of that useful tool.

The exhibition also reflects a triumph of durability; most toys are, by definition 'loved to death'. Only the passion of the collector has rescued this extraordinarily diverse array from the nursery and the toy box!

Recent Acquisitions

Rare Maori treasures returned to Auckland Museum

Three rare Maori artefacts taken out of the country over one hundred years ago have been brought back to New Zealand by Auckland Museum.

On behalf of the Museum, Curator of Ethnology Dr Roger Neich attended a Sotheby's ethnic art auction in Sydney and against strong international competition was able to secure these treasures for the Collection.

A finely carved Maori smoking pipe in the form of a small crouching figure with paua shell eyes was collected in the 1880s by Alfred Bock (1835-1820), a well-known Australian painter, photographer and engraver.

Two very rare traditional Maori tokotoko staffs collected in the North

Island in the 1890s by Australian Major Alex Wynyard Joss (1872-1954) fill an important gap in the museum's wideranging collection of Maori staffs and walking sticks. These tokotoko represent an original Maori version of the traditional Polynesian form of chiefly staff used during speech making. Very few are held in museum collections either in New Zealand or overseas. Probably dating from about the 1830s, the carving style of these two suggest that they came from the Taranaki/Whanganui area.

Guard changed at Museum
