Director's message

This year we honour the 90th anniversary of the sacrifice made by those who fell at Gallipoli, and, by extension, all other New Zealanders who have given their lives or their good health for our country. Gallipoli has emerged as a fulcrum moment in our history, a defining moment in the march from colony to sovereign nation. Perhaps more has been attached to Gallipoli than it truly should bear, but that is not important. What is important is that Gallipoli and Anzac Day provide us with a moment when we collectively pause- "lest we forget"- and take stock of who it is we are as a people, what we believe in, and what we aspire to become. A 90th anniversary is a very special moment. It is, at once, a long time ago and very recent. We have come a long way as a people since 1915, but it has also happened very quickly. Nine decades is not that long.

The decision of Auckland's Citizens Committee, in the 1920s, to build a new museum building as this City's (and Province's) war memorial, was an enlightened one. The Museum embodies all of that for which our soldiers paid the ultimate price. It is an archive of who we are and where we live. But the war memorial also makes us unique. It validates all the Museum does, and gives us a duty to tell stories and offer programmes that focus on our memorial function. Since 1995 we have proudly offered the exhibition Scars on the Heart. A year later we opened The Armoury, and we continue to enhance its resources and databases. Programmes and multimedia are regularly added to the top floor, and since last year we have begun to place additional focus on Armistice Day. It is a duty we proudly discharge, and a great strength of Auckland War Memorial Museum.

Cruisy job


The Museum's Head of Collection Management Dr Oliver Stead has recently returned from a voyage on the cruise ship Prinsendam. A five-star, 38, 800 ton ship with accommodation for 793 passengers, Prinsendam is operated by the Holland America Line out of Seattle. Some time ago curators were approached for possible interest in guest lecturing on cruise ships by an agent in New York, via the Museum's Tourism and Market Development office. Oliver took up the challenge, and in February presented a series of lectures on the Prinsendam on her cruise from Honolulu to Auckland. In exchange Oliver and wife Virginia got free travel and accommodation. Talk about a cruisy job!

Based on the collections and resources of Auckland Museum, Oliver's lectures were presented as highly illustrated Powerpoint shows. These were given live as well as broadcast on the ship's internal TV channel. The theatre audiences of up to 250 were mainly older Americans with some European nationalities.

The ship has a huge theatre which is fully booked with all kinds of entertainment including Broadway musical items, classical recitals and Bingo. The lecture brief was to give a cultural and historical introduction to the stops along the way: Chistmas Island (a former nuclear test site), Apia, Suva, Mt Maunganui and Auckland. Oliver covered Polynesian cultures and the art of the Pacific Islands in general, and the cultural history of Samoa, Tonga, Fiji and New Zealand in particular. Each 50 minute show used up to 150 images from Auckland Museum's vast pictorial resources to illustrate Pacific Island themes.

In addition to the lecture obligations Oliver and Virginia were also expected to work hard entertaining the other guests, so their days were pretty full! The guests were very appreciative and especially fond of New Zealand. Some of them spent most of their retirement on cruise ships, and one old fellow from New York was on his 14th world cruise. The trip provided a valuable opportunity to promote Auckland Museum and its collections to an influential group of tourists, and also to experience New Zealand's tourist services from the tourists' point of view.

In Honolulu Oliver and Virginia were able to visit the famous Bishop Museum, where they were very warmly received by the delightful staff and shown fantastic Hawaiian treasures, including one of the most precious items of all in Hawaiian culture, a seven metre feather waist wrap woven for a royal princess, requiring feathers from hundreds of thousands of o'o birds. In Suva they visited the Fiji Museum, one of the most effectively-presented small museums in the South Pacific, and were captivated by a fantastic display of Fijian voyaging canoes or ndrua, and a brave (by New Zealand standards) and incisive exhibition on Fijian cannibalism.

Models for Living: 1905 - 2005

A survey of 100 years of NZ residential architecture

What is a New Zealand house? Models for Living features architecturally designed houses dated from 1905 to the present, from the 'working man's house' of the early 1900s to a 2005 design for an as yet unfinished home. Specially made scale models and digital presentations expose the design and detail of each house in three dimensions.

While public interest in architecture and interior design has grown hugely over the last decade, most of the public are only partially aware of the extraordinary range of architects' responses to the design of the New Zealand house. "Per capita, New Zealand has perhaps more architect-designed houses than any other country in the world. It has also, at times, been among the most self-conscious in its pursuit of both 'internationalism' and a distinctive, indigenous 'New Zealand identity' rooted in attitudes towards the land. It is timely to promote wider acknowledgement, understanding and recognition of the fascinating diversity of ideas, styles, materials and architectural careers that have contributed the kind of architecture that we think we know best: the house, our house", Charles Walker, Exhibition Curator.

Ernst Plischke in New Zealand

From the City Art Gallery Wellington comes Ernst Plischke in New Zealand an exhibition that celebrates the New Zealand work of renowned Austrian architect Ernst Plischke. Plischke practised in New Zealand from 1939 until 1963, making a profound and influential contribution to New Zealand architecture and urban planning. The exhibition comprises plans, drawings and photographs that illustrate the extent and quality of Plischke's work in this country, highlighting his role as both an ideologue and practitioner, in the fields of town-planning and house, church, monument and furniture design.

This exhibition brings attention to Plischke's architectural legacy in New Zealand and particularly Wellington, where the best examples of his mature work exist. The exhibition includes original plans and drawings, vintage and contemporary photographs of Plischke buildings, furniture, architectural models, and books, correspondence and ephemera related to Plischke's time in New Zealand. Ernst Plischke is presented to Auckland Museum from the City Gallery Wellington exhibition Ernst Plischke — Architect and is held in association with the New Zealand Institute of Architects and AGM publishers.

Monique Redmond: Housing

Embroidered mementos of the NZ home

Eight digitally embroidered works make up Monique Redmond's exhibition, Housing. The images are drawn from photos of houses found in old family photo albums and archives, evoking women's roles and relationships with their homes and previous generations. Housing reveals and reminds us of the relationships women have had with their domestic environment. The works are conceived from images from old photo albums or historical street photos located by the artist of houses from her own neighbourhood or those of friends. The pictures of houses are embroidered in one continuous thread onto the canyos.

90th anniversary tribute exhibition

The agony that was Gallipoli has touched every New Zealand community. On the 90th anniversary of this tremendous conflict Auckland War Memorial Museum acknowledges the bravery, enterprise and persistence of our Anzac forces; while recalling the horror and tragedy they faced. In this tribute exhibition, Bloody Gallipoli, we pay homage to those who fought, lived and died at Gallipoli.

Bloody Gallipoli is an emotional journey through the events and sites of the campaign. The exhibition accompanies our forces from their landing at the daunting Anzac Cove to the bloody attack at Chunuk Bair and beyond, giving visitors a glimpse of what it might have been like for Anzacs in crowded trenches and bivvies.

It is a difficult story set on a tiny stage. The entire eight month campaign was fought on an area roughly 1/8 the size of Rangitoto Island. During this time around 30,000 Anzac soldiers - the current population of the West Coast region of the South Island - lived and fought on this narrow tract of land caught between the firing line and the sea. The environment was that of a suffocating concentration camp with bivouacs, depots, dressing stations, ammunition dumps, headquarters, kitchens, mule lines, roads, tracks, trenches, latrines and gun emplacements squashed onto 750 desperate acres!

The exhibition takes its title from the book Bloody Gallipoli by co-curator Richard Stowers. Bloody Gallipoli is the definitive guide to New Zealand's involvement from the first landings until the final evacuation of the Gallipoli Penninsula. Drawing on personal diaries and reproducing many neverbefore-seen photographs, the book provides new insights into a campaign that 90 years on shows no sign of losing its poignancy to new generations of New Zealanders

A very special Anzac Monday 25 April

On this, the 90th anniversary of the Gallipoli landing, Auckland War Memorial Museum is proud to be providing an extended programme to augment the official commemoration of the day.

RETURN OF THE MUMMY

Return of the Mummy

One of Auckland Museum's favourite treasures is back on display after a seven year absence. In 1998 the Egyptian mummy was removed from public view by Museum staff concerned for her fragile condition to await funds to embark on a comprehensive conservation project which is now complete.

The project was kick-started in 2001 thanks to a grant received from the Chisholm Whitney Family Charitable Trust. The conservation treatment has included a detailed analysis of the materials used to embalm the body and decorate the sarcophagus, and painstaking stabilisation and repositioning of bandages.

The process culminated in a recent CT scan at Auckland's Mercy Hospital where a treasure trove of information was uncovered. The mummy is definitely female and was likely in her twenties. Remarkably her teeth are in wonderful condition - uncommon for the time, and show possible evidence of several extractions. Dentistry in Ancient Egypt is almost unheard of. In complete contrast to earlier tradition, some organs including the brain are partially intact and in place. This leads to speculation as to whether there were circumstances where an absence of organ removel was acceptable, or if this was simply a case of a lazy embalmer.

Now the conservation is complete, the mummy can take the last step in her journey and be transferred to a special display case that has been commissioned to ensure her preservation by retarding the deterioration process. It will not only exclude oxygen from the mummy's immediate environment. but also lower humidity levels. The case was designed and built by engineering firm DeviceWorks of Parnell, based on a design by the Getty Conservation Institute

Tawa is the name Maori bestowed on a remarkable man more famously known as Capt Gilbert Mair. During his time he was presented with taonga - Maori ancestral items of prestige - by communities who were trying to come to grips with colonisation, seeking advocacy from someone they could trust. Mair became such a man and his heroic deeds in war, during the Tarawera eruption and later facilitating land court deals have since passed into our nation's lore and history books.

Ko Tawa comprises 30 items (selected from Mair's collection of 236 taonga), each with an amazing story to tell intimately linking today's descendants to ancestral landscapes as remembered, treasured and then presented by nineteenth century elders. What makes this collection stand out from any other in the world is Mair's understanding of the obligations inherent in receiving these taonga, not least the preserving the narratives that wrapped around them at the time of presentation.

Today, Mair's collection, which engages tribes from throughout the central North Island rests in Auckland Museum. The goal has been to create an exhibition that makes these very special taonga accessible again to a new generation of descendants who for the most part are now growing up away from home communities, but yet still want to remain connected in some meaningful way as they continue a modern way of life. The Ko Tawa Project comprises not only an exhibition, but also publications, DVD-film documentary, Web accessible database and education programme.

At the heart of Ko Tawa is the taonga themselves who will collectively rest in an architecturallydesigned canoe-like structure, or waka huia, that appears to be suspended to the ceiling and complimented by vivid AV imagery of the originating landscapes, ancestors and today's elders. The exhibition will open on 10 June 2005 commemorating the Tarawera Eruption as symbolised by a particular waka huia that was presented to Mair by one of the survivors he helped save.
