

SACRED HEART BASILICA, TIMARU

The Sacred Heart Basilica or Timaru Basilica, as it is popularly known because of its style of architecture, is a Catholic church in Timaru, New Zealand. It was designed by the prominent New Zealand architect, Francis Petre and is one of his most celebrated works. Its great size and beauty make it one of the most important historic buildings of Timaru and of the South Canterbury region. The Basilica's twin towers and copper cupola are highly visible features of the Timaru skyline, especially from the south.

The Basilica of the Sacred Heart is the third church built on the Craigie Avenue property. A wooden chapel was opened on 25 October 1874, and was replaced three years later by a larger church. Increasing numbers of parishioners dictated the need for a further, and even larger building.

The foundation stone was laid by Bishop Grimes, assisted by Bishop Verdon of Dunedin on 6 February 1910. It was timely that the church was completed in 1911. The wooden church had burnt down in 1910 and Mass had been offered in the boys' school until the Basilica was ready. The building cost £23,000 and was practically completed and paid for by the time of the opening and consecration, on Rosary Sunday, 1 October 1911.

At the head of the nave is the internal dome, supported by Ionic columns, and buttressed by external walls It rises to a height of 21.33 metres (70 feet) from the floor. The internal dome is one of the main artistic features, and over this dome rests the central tower out of which rises the coppered cupola (the external dome) of the church. The cupola rises to a height of 35 metres (115 feet) and is in square tower-like fashion. Two small domes surmount the towers that flank the façade and there is another internal dome above the sanctuary centering the apse of the basilica.

The Basilica has 26 stained glass windows. Eight of those windows are high above in the apse; each approximately 200 cm x 95 cm. which were ordered from John Hardman & Co., Birmingham, England for a total cost of £240. The windows on the north side were manufactured by F.X. Zettler in Munich Germany. The donors of the windows are named on marble tablets at the head of the nave and throughout the Basilica.

Although Geraldine has a WWI & WWII Memorial, it does not appear to have a South African War Memorial. Possible names for such a memorial would be:

- CLARKE, Daniel
- Mc KAY, Daniel &
- MONAHAN, William Gibb.

TEMUKA SOUTH AFRICAN WAR MEMORIAL GATES (CLARKE, Daniel)

The Temuka South African (Boer) War memorial comprises the formal entry gates to the Temuka Domain and Public Gardens. The memorial comprises four gate posts and substantial wrought iron gates including two walking access gates and a carriage width gate, plus a 'ticket box'. The gates are a part of the whole front wall of the Domain, and the whole was fabricated from Timaru bluestone by the mason H.B. Hall. Four engraved white marble tablets record the names, dates and place of the death of four local men who fought in the South Africa War






TIMARU EVENING POST, 24 November 1913, Page 9

"Timaru, 23rd November. A beautiful memorial window in the Roman Catholic Church was dedicated this afternoon to the memory of **Sergeant William Byrne**, the first local man to lose his life in the Boer war. The subject is the baptism in the Jordan. A procession of excontingenters and other military attended at the morning service. At the morning service eight other windows, scriptural subjects, decorating the chancel, the gifts of different individuals and parties, were dedicated."

There is conflicting information as to name of William Byrne's brother who served in the South African War. Two possibilities: (almost certainly the same person)


Daniel Joseph Byrne (# 2347) or Dudley Alexander Byrne (#2347 & WWI #13386)
