The chairman of the Professorial Board (Professor J. P. Gabbatt) stressed the importance of post-graduate work. This really completed the work of the University. It was often necessary for the student to leave New Zealand to take up post-graduate work. In connection with the Royal Holloway Scholarship for women, this originally was worth £50 a year, and the board added £100. Conditions now had changed, and it cost £250 a year to live in England. They wanted someone to give £2000, to be invested for the purpose of adding to this scholarship. Canterbury College had had a perfectly marvellous War record. He had not seen any record in the English Universities that came up to it. The college sent 440 men to the Front, and 90 were killed. Two had been awarded the C.M.G., 11 the D.S.O., one the D.S.C., 20 the M.C., six the M.M., two the D.C.M., and five had received foreign decorations. Professor Gabbatt also made reference to the scheme for a stained glass window as a War memorial. This would cost about £1500. It was desired to record on a brass tablet the names of those who served and those who fell. This would cost about £250.

After the ceremony, Dr Thacker addressed the undergraduates from his car, and on his invitation they marched to the city, attired in their gowns, to partake of refreshments.
