PRINCESS CHRISTINE 13th STATIONARY HOSPITAL, PINETOWN, NATAL.

When the 2nd Anglo- Boer War broke out in 1899, Natal was a British colony. Troop trains regularly passed through Pinetown on the way to the northern battlefields, carrying troops who had landed at the port of Durban. With an abundance of water close to the railway line and a healthy climate, Pinetown was an ideal spot for the military hospital. Mr Frank Stevens of Sarnia offered apportion of his land and the existing "Fairydene" buildings to the British Government for use as a military hospital. Mr. Alfred Moseley of Middlesex donated equipment and a prefabricated hospital building which was shipped out from England in pieces.

Helena "Princess Christian", a daughter of Queen Victoria, gave her name to the 13th Stationary Hospital which was officially opened on 26 May 1900.

Both British troops and Boer Prisoners of War were treated at the hospital. Cases of enteric fever accounted for 26 deaths and there were a further 7 deaths from dysentery. The hospital recorded a total of 47 fatalities including Petrus Pretorius, a POW. The deceased were buried at St John's Anglican Church cemetery or Marianhill Mission.

The hospital closed in 1902. In 1905 the "Fairydene' hotel was opened by Mr Frank Stevens. In 1985 it became a Retirement Home.

The Guild of Loyal Women erected the sandstone Anglo-Boer War Memorial in the cemetery in 1922.

THOMAS TURNER PALETHORPE

He attended Christchurch Catherdral (primary) School, Christchurch Boys High School. He graduated from Canterbury Agricultural (Lincoln) College in 1897 with the Diploma of Agriculture.

He travelled independently to South Africa with Messrs Brittain & Dunkley, the son of Archdeacon Dunkley. They sailed on the S.S. Waikare on Friday 15 September 1899. On arrival in Cape Town, he joined Bethune's Mounted Infantry with which he did some excellent work. His squadron was ambushed by the Boers in May 1900.

He became a lieutenant in the Johannesburg Mounted Rifles.

In February 1900 he contracted a serious illness through lying in damp blankets and was confined to hospital in Charlestown but was discharged at the beginning of March and returned to duty. Shortly afterwards, he contracted enteric fever and died in Pinetown, South Africa on 23 March, 1901.



ENTERIC FEVER


Before WW I, enteric fever, or typhoid fever, was the scourge of armies, and in the Anglo-Boer War killed more soldiers than enemy action. It is caused by a bacteria entering the body via contaminated food or water. Early symptoms include high fever, headaches and lassitude. Follicles along the intestinal walls later become inflamed, often leading to perforation and haemorrhaging. Other complications include gall bladder, pneumonia or heart failure.

At the time of the Boer War, there were no antibiotic remedies for the disease.






